The MBI Al Jaber Foundation is pleased to announce support for a unique project at the University of Westminster which will enable the refurbishment of the birthplace of British cinema.

Building on a relationship going back to the mid-90s, the Foundation will be making a major gift to the University of Westminster to enable the refurbishment of its Grade II listed entrance on Regent Street in the heart of London's West End, henceforth to be known as the MBI Al Jaber Grand Hall.

The agreement was signed by Foundation Chairman MBI Al Jaber and Vice Chancellor Geoff Petts in the presence of Westminster's Chancellor Lord Paul in July 2009 and is the latest in a series of capital grants made by the Foundation to elite institutions of higher education, including at Corpus Christi, Oxford, and UCL.

The Regent Street address has always been seen as the University of Westminster's flagship, home of the first polytechnic. It is a listed building and contains many historical firsts including the world's first photography school, the first demonstration of the Lumiere brother's Cinematograph, and the birthplace of Cinema in the UK.

The Regent Street Project will be the first major Capital Project that encapsulates the University of Westminster vision for 2015 set out by the new Vice Chancellor Geoff Petts. The foyer and cinema will be turned into a 'shop window' highlighting the University and the building's historical importance and including a designated area to hold special events, as well as promoting the internationalism and diversity for which the University is renowned through series of public lectures and cinema screenings within the heart of London.

On completion of the project, the Foundation plans to host a Middle East Film Series at the University, acknowledging the important role of film and documentaries in raising awareness and building bridges between cultures.

Alumni Update

News from Jordan

Our Scholarships Officer Suhad Jarrar-Browne caught up with our Alumni on a recent visit to Jordan. Here's an update from two of them, Rana Al Akhal and Tareq Younis who studied two very different courses for their postgraduate degrees.



Rana followed the LEAD (Leadership in Environmental and Sustainable Development) programme under the auspices of Imperial College London, and Tareq opted for a Masters' Degree in Ethnomusicology at SOAS, University of London. Since graduating they both work in development.

In describing LEAD, the sessions for which were based in Pakistan, Rana says "LEAD was the turning point in my life. I learned more about people, countries, cultures, and personal development in one session than I learnt in all the years of my BA Degree. LEAD taught me the essence of life, how to accept, appreciate, help and tolerate others."

Tareq chose the course at SOAS to focus on composing music whilst at the same time studying the factors that influence the development of melodies, lyrics or musical instruments. He also looked at the importance of documentation. Tareq worked on collecting, archiving and analysing folkloric children's music in Jordan for use in the Family Education Programme in economically deprived areas in coordination with The Information and Research Centre at the King Hussein Foundation.

Both Tareq and Rana are doing a lot for their communities in Jordan. Rana runs her own consultation firm (Medal Consult) and gives training on management, strategic planning and HR. Her goals are "to build a market that understands gender concepts and the importance of gender equality and women's empowerment." Tareq's motto is 'music without borders' and he believes that musicians are educators with responsibility towards the education and development of the young generation in society.

The King Fahad National Library Book Donation

In keeping with its previous support for education and the humanities in the Arabian Peninsula, the MBI Al Jaber Foundation is donating the entire collection of Seminar for Arabian Studies Proceedings to the King Fahad National Library, located in Riyadh in Saudi Arabia.

Papers read at the Foundation-supported Seminar are published annually in the Proceedings of the Seminar for Arabian Studies in time for the Seminar of the following year. The Proceedings contain new research on Arabia and reports of new discoveries in the Peninsula in a wide range of disciplines. At the recent Seminar for Arabian Studies at The British Museum in London, the Library had been kind enough to loan the Foundation a range of its own books on archaeology to have on display which proved to be of great interest to the participants. The books will be added to the Library's existing collection of 1,300,000 items of information plus 200,000 historical documents. The



Connecting Cultures 2009: Ambassadors of Change

In Istanbul at the UN Alliance of Civilisations Market Place of ideas for innovative projects on April 6th 2009, Connecting Cultures was identified as one of the world's most innovative civil society projects in the field of intercultural dialogue. Connecting Cultures' 2009 desert journey is also endorsed and supported by the UNESCO office in Doha and ISESCO.



Trustees Speak at UCL

The Autumn term at University College London sees two of the Foundation Trustees giving talks.

On 22nd October our Patron and Chairman MBI Al Jaber will speak on 'Education, Entrepreneurship and Philanthropy in the 21st Century'. This event follows on from a successful 'in conversation' with Vice-Provost Professor Michael Worton in 2006 at which MBI Al Jaber spoke on 'Educational Reform and the Culture of Democracy in the Arab World'. The talks are part of the ongoing partnership between the MBI Al Jaber Foundation and UCL which also includes a major capital donation from the Foundation.
