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UNESCO and MBI Al Jaber Foundation join forces to strengthen the education system and support transition in Yemen



Mrs Irina Bokova, Director General, and HE Sheikh Mohamed Bin Issa Al Jaber, UNESCO Special Envoy for Education, Tolerance and Cultures, launched a project enabling the development of an integrated, sector-wide strategy to address the challenges facing the education sector in Yemen.

In response to requests made by the Yemeni Government, and in partnership with UNESCO, Sheikh Mohamed Bin Issa Al Jaber, on behalf of the MBI Al Jaber Foundation, has agreed to provide \$1 million to fund a two-year project in Yemen. The project, working with the Yemeni Ministries of Education, Technical and Vocational Education and Higher Education and Research, will be focused on improving and strengthening the education system and its service delivery. It will enable the formulation of a new national vision for education, developing a platform which can support the broad spectrum of the country's educational needs and lead the reform of technical and vocational training, ensuring that the country is delivering a labour force equipped to meet the demands of the labour market.

At current growth rates, the population of Yemen is set to double in just 25 years and with almost 50% of the population under the age of 15, the strain on the education and training systems across the country is considerable. The educational infrastructure required to improve the situation is in a state of disrepair due to the internal conflict, with more than 810 schools having been destroyed or damaged. While there have been improvements in the levels of literacy in Yemen, there is still much to be done.

The agreement was signed at UNESCO Headquarters on 7 February 2013 and implementation will commence during the summer.

'Yemen: Challenges for the Future' an International Conference hosted by the London Middle East Institute, SOAS.

The British-Yemeni Society held a two-day conference in January to discuss the challenges facing Yemen.

The conference, sponsored by the MBI Al Jaber Foundation, brought together academic and professional specialists to discuss recent research on Yemen and the challenges ahead. The conference was opened by HE Sheikh Mohamed Bin Issa Al Jaber, Alan Duncan MP, the UK Minister of State for International Development; Noel Brehony, Chairman of the British-Yemeni Society and Hassan Hakimian the MBI Al Jaber Director of the LMEI.



Keynote speeches were given by Dr Abubakr al-Qirbi, Yemeni Foreign Minister and Dr Muhammad al-Saadi, Yemeni Minister of Planning & International Cooperation. Both ministers expressed their sincere gratitude to LMEI and to Sheikh Mohamed for their help and support in organising the conference.

More than eighty delegates attended the Conference Dinner on the evening of 11th January, which took place at SOAS. Guests included leading academics and regional specialists, representatives of the Yemeni Government and the UK Foreign and Commonwealth Office.





Improving Journalism in Yemen



This spring the MBI Al Jaber Foundation travelled to Sana'a, Yemen to prepare for the journalism training Institute we plan to establish there. This will be the first independent school for journalism in the country and an important addition to the growing body of news outlets that have developed since the revolution in 2011. Training will cover print and broadcast media as well as practical instruction.

Much of our time was spent with Abdullah Ghorab, the country's top journalist and an influential figure in Arabic media. We also met with Prime Minister Mohammed Basindawa and the Minister of Information, Ali Al-Imrani



Another highlight of our visit was seeing alumni of the MBI Al Jaber Foundation post-graduate scholarship programme. These former students are now working in Sana'a with important NGOs and international organisations, helping to improve their communities.

Help for Mali – The MBI Al Jaber Foundation lends support to the call for the preservation of the country's cultural heritage



The Foundation supports an international meeting of experts to discuss the safeguarding of Mali's cultural heritage.

The MBI Al Jaber Foundation has played a pivotal role in convening a recent UNESCO conference to discuss the protection of Mali's cultural heritage and to enable the fine-tuning of a definitive plan, which will safeguard the region's ancient tombs, artefacts and manuscripts.

The meeting on 18 February 2013 was opened by Ms Irina Bokova, UNESCO Director General; Ms Aurelie Filippetti, Minister of Culture and Communication of France; Mr Bruno Maiga, Minister of Culture of Mali and HE Mr Solomon Jason Mbuzi, Chairman of UNESCO Africa Group, and Ambassador and Permanent Delegate of Zambia to UNESCO.

The meeting began with a status report on Mali's cultural heritage and went on to consider the possible responses to the current crisis. During the final session, the UNESCO plan of action and associated budget was discussed in detail to ensure that the efforts of the international community, and other partners, would be coordinated effectively and efficiently. The conference was followed by a concert including artists from Mali and the wider region.

Since May of 2012, the UNESCO World Heritage Sites of Timbuktu and Gao have been repeatedly attacked by Islamic militants and, as a result, have suffered considerable damage. Eleven of the sixteen tombs in Timbuktu have been destroyed and it is estimated that some 2000 to 3000 ancient manuscripts have been burned. The current fear is that artefacts and manuscripts will be illicitly trafficked - smuggled from Mali and eventually sold on the black market to interested parties.

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Mali in Transition: Interdisciplinary Perspectives.

Organised by the Centre of African Studies and SOAS, University of London, the MBI Al Jaber Foundation was a key sponsor for this two-day conference in central London. Participants included academics, aid workers, policy strategists, and artisans. Four panels focused on the following themes:

- · Interdisciplinary perspectives on the crisis
- Emergency crisis and impact of humanitarian action
- Heritage and conservation
- · Historical perspectives and future scenarios



A range of material was presented. Highlights included a joint presentation by Mohamed Alher Ag Almahdi, a Malian Tuareg manuscript conservationist and David Jacobs, a senior conservationist at the British Library. Together they discussed their collaboration on the restoration of ancient books in Timbuktu. Julian Richards, another notable presenter, hosted a screening of his 2006 film, With the Nomads, a documentary about nomadic life in West Africa.






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British Foundation for the Study of Arabia
